

The History of Bourbon in Kentucky

Bourbon is not just a type of whiskey; it is a symbol of American craftsmanship and cultural heritage, and its story is deeply rooted in Kentucky. Its origins trace back to the 18th century, when settlers from Scotland, Ireland, and Wales brought their distilling knowledge to the American frontier. Kentucky's limestone-rich soil provided excellent conditions for growing corn, a key ingredient in bourbon, while the natural limestone-filtered water helped create a smooth, distinct flavor, differentiating bourbon from other whiskeys.

The birth of bourbon is often associated with Elijah Craig, a Baptist minister, who is credited with aging whiskey in charred oak barrels around the late 1700s. Though this story may be more legend than fact, it is certain that Kentucky distillers began experimenting with barrel-aging techniques during this time, leading to the signature rich, caramel notes bourbon is known for today. By the early 19th century, bourbon had gained a reputation for quality and began shipping from Bourbon County, Kentucky, to New Orleans. Barrels marked with "Bourbon County" quickly gained recognition, and the name stuck, defining a distinct American spirit.

The bourbon industry faced challenges with the onset of Prohibition in 1920, when distilleries across the U.S. were forced to close. However, a few distilleries were granted licenses to produce "medicinal whiskey," helping some survive the period. After Prohibition, the industry slowly rebuilt, but it wasn't until the late 20th century that bourbon experienced a revival, spurred by an increase in demand for American-made products and a growing appreciation for artisanal spirits.

Today, Kentucky produces about 95% of the world's bourbon, and the industry contributes over \$9 billion annually to the state's economy. Many of the historic distilleries have been revitalized, with brands like Maker's Mark, Woodford Reserve, and Jim Beam expanding their reach internationally. Bourbon tourism has flourished, with the **Kentucky Bourbon Trail** attracting hundreds of thousands of visitors each year. This resurgence underscores bourbon's transformation from a regional specialty to a globally recognized and celebrated spirit, securing Kentucky's status as the true home of bourbon.

On our Tour along the **Kentucky Bourbon Trail**, we will be visiting Maker's Mark for an included tour and tasting. Optionally you can visit one of several other nearby distilleries, including Buffalo Trace, Bardstown Bourbon Company, Jim Beam and many others. Earlier on our Tour you will have visited (and tasted) the Jack Daniels Distillery in Tennessee.

Our Tour route takes us from Lexington (3 nights) to Bardstown (1 night) to Bowling Green (1 night) along the Bourbon Trail, so you might want to check out the region and perhaps pick your favorites as optional stopping points.
